With regards to our future practical work we have designed a three year programme of studies centred around six key areas (Forth & Clyde Canal - 2, Union Canal -4). Our ongoing activities will focus on these areas as we try to find those elusive roosts, build Habitat Use Profiles, study diet and audit the monitoring carried out during the first five years. Add to this our course programme and you can see that another busy season awaits, with lots for people to get involved with.

# **Foraging Surveys**

Last year Habitat Use Profiling delivered good results relating to the narrowing down of roost locations. This information has contributed greatly to the selection of the six study areas where we are now going to focus our future activities upon.

In 2006 our volunteers will be contributing towards a new survey that has been developed to look at which sections of these canals are more attractive to foraging Daubenton's. The data collected from this study will also *feed* into the other studies being carried out in the same locations.

## **BaTML Publications Online** (Soon, Very Soon!)

Some challenges occurred as we tried to tackle the best way in which to put our results into the public domain. The initial idea of a written report issued to only a small number didn't feel right, in that with so many people having been involved (100+) it was unfair not to make our material more widely accessible. In addition, a single hard copy report would have been restricted in size, leaving out much of the detail that some may have found of interest. After much thought we decided that an ongoing, living journal was a far better approach. It allows us to add to it as/when new information becomes ready and it also means that you only need to download the articles you are interested in. BaTML Publications will be available online, via our website, this month (April 2006). All of our volunteers/funders are being offered free access; contact us for details. Beyond this 'free access' group, others may subscribe after paying a one off fee (currently; Individuals - £25; Organisations/Institutions - £100).

#### **Profile: Daubenton's Bat**

The bulk of our survey activity relates to Daubenton's bat (*Myotis daubentonii*). Here are some interesting facts relating to this species (pictured on right).

They can be found throughout mainland UK with the exception of the Northern Isles and many of the Western Isles. Regarded as a medium sized UK bat, with a body mass of between 6.5-15g, they have a wingspan of 240-275mm and a forearm length of between 33 and 42mm. It has been estimated that the UK population of this species is circa 150,000 (40,000 in Scotland). Typically the dorsal fur is brown and the ventral fur pale buff in colour. They have relatively short ears and a blunt tragus, which is less than half the length of the ear. These bats have a strong affinity with calmer stretches of water, above which they feed by taking insects close to or from the surface. As such, our canals are an ideal habitat.
