Potted History

BaTML was formally launched in 2000 with a view to studying the bats using the canal corridors within the Central Belt of Scotland. The initial study used a new survey method in order to track bats as they flew along the narrow canal corridors. The project was initially intended to last 5 seasons (up to 2005), however due to the amount of support we received a number of new projects were added to the original study and the project was extended to 2007.

These additional projects ranged from studying insect diversity (led by Craig Macadam) through to the foraging behaviour of Daubenton's bats (led by David Dodds). Latterly we also did a radio tracking survey in order to find new bat roosts (led by Neil Middleton and Natalie Taylor). All of these studies are still ongoing and at various stages of completion.

The website allowed us to keep our supporters aware of what was going on, as well as also providing a good resource of bat information. We regularly answered general bat queries from not the only UK, but many other countries around the world. Latterly the site also served as a vehicle upon which to publish our results through BaTML Publications.

We feel it is too early to close the site down as some people may still wish to find out what the project was all about and indeed it is still ongoing. Our plans over the coming months is to turn this resource into an historical account of the project, as well as an area where results and newsletters can be freely accessed. As such the site will remain online for at least 2 years and Echoes Ecology Ltd have agreed to sponsor the updates and pay for the ongoing running costs during this time.
