We already started this years surveys back in February in conjunction with a study being carried out by Kirsty Gourlay (Final Year Student at Napier University) looking into bat behaviour on the canals from Winter through to early Summer. Our first Daubenton's appeared on the Union Canal on 18th March, whilst Soprano pipistrelle's had already been around for a couple of weeks prior. On the other hand Bandit pipistrelle has yet to be recorded this year.

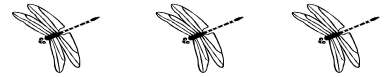

# The Diet Of Daubenton's Bats on The Millennium Link



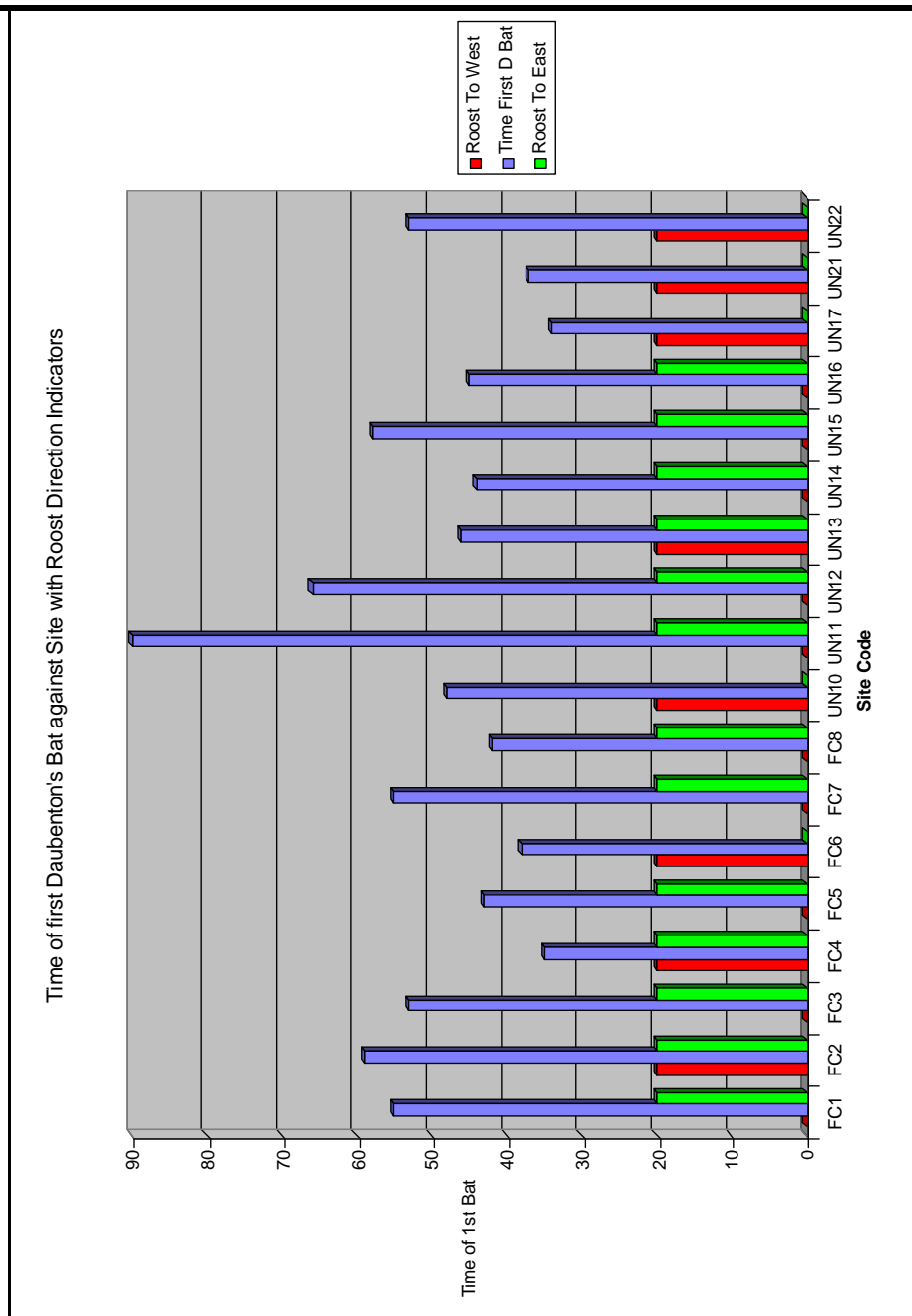
The first phase of the project to investigate the diet of Daubenton's bats along The Millennium Link has begun. Aquatic invertebrate surveys have been undertaken at Fawnsparck (UN16) on the Union Canal and Auchinstarry (FC6) on the Forth & Clyde Canal. Surveys consisted of a systematic search of the marginal vegetation at each site, followed by a scoop of the sediment on the canal bed. The initial survey results show that the canal holds a healthy population of aquatic invertebrates, however the majority of the specimens collected live solely within the water and would therefore not be available to foraging bats.

Aquatic insects, the potential prey of bats, were most common at Auchinstarry where 8 separate families of insect were recorded. The most common were the non-biting midges (Chironomidae). These small insects are well known prey items of many species of bat and it was expected that they would make up the majority of specimens found. In addition to the Chironomidae we also found alderflies, caddisflies, damselflies, aquatic beetles, pond skaters and backswimmers. At Fawnsparck we found alderflies, caddisflies, non-biting midges, damselflies, water crickets and lesser water boatmen.

The samples collected will now be identified to species level and as such this will allow flight periods, adult sizes and hence the potential for any of these species to be a prey item for bats to be determined. Future work will include: the collection of insects during periods when bats are actively foraging, the analysis of bat droppings and further aquatic invertebrate surveys.

We have collected lots of data so far, some of which we shared with you in our last newsletter. The graph below shows the time of the first bat recorded relative to minutes after sunset and the probable direction where roost is located.
